

Typical Watershed District Dam



PL-566 Activities

FY 2017 -

- SAKW/NWC success story 5 years in the making
- \$150 million appropriated in omnibus bill
- NRCS Requested Proposals from all Watershed Districts with PL-566 dams still planned and from any watershed district proposing a PL-566 work plan
 - 11 proposals were received from 5 watershed districts
 - Upper Black Vermillion
 - Delaware 10
 - Wolf River
 - Doyle Creek
 - Middle Creek
 - One proposal received from Pawnee Watershed was to complete their remaining dams through a PL-566 Work Plan
 - 9 proposals (dams) were approved for work plan updates and 2 design updates
 - UBV, Del 10, and Wolf

PL-566 Activities Cont'd

FY 2018

- \$150 million appropriated in omnibus bill
- Proposals approved for Doyle Creek, Middle Creek, Delaware 10, and Upper Black Vermillion watershed districts for feasibility study and work plan updates.

FY 2019

- \$150 million funding is included in proposed USDA budget.
- New proposals have until July 15 for submittal.

2018 Farm Bill

- Authorizes \$50 million mandatory funding through FY 2028.

State Funded Watershed Program

- FY 2020 Budget
 - - \$550,000 approved for Dam Construction or Rehabilitation
 - - Highest program level was \$1.5 million just 10 years ago
 - - 500+ Dams on the ground

Program Challenges

- Lack of applications for dam construction and/or rehabilitation
 - Being able to report program benefits
 - Watershed Districts need for Section 404 permits
 - Legislative support for future funding depends on application levels at or above current funding levels
