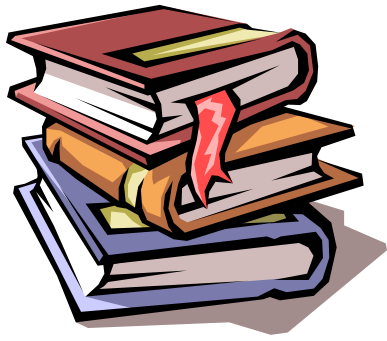


# SAKW, Seventy Two Years and Counting

# Assistance to Watershed Districts

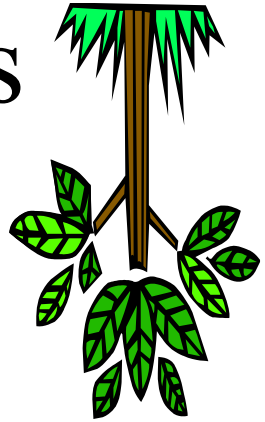
- Keep Watershed Districts Informed of Program Changes

# SAKW Environmental Goals

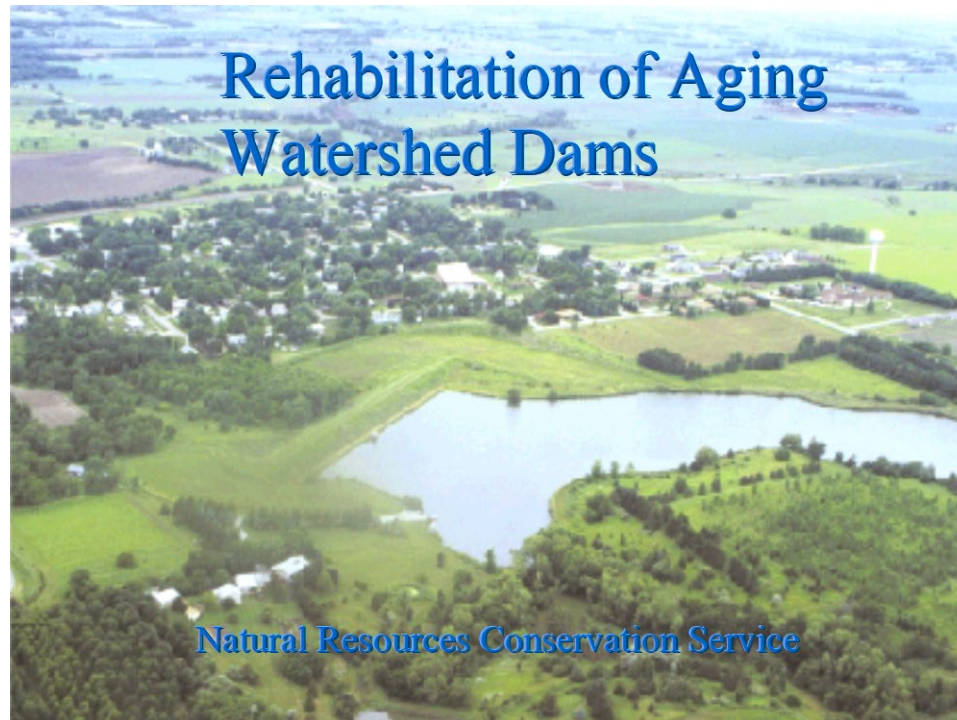


- Be Better Stewards of the Land

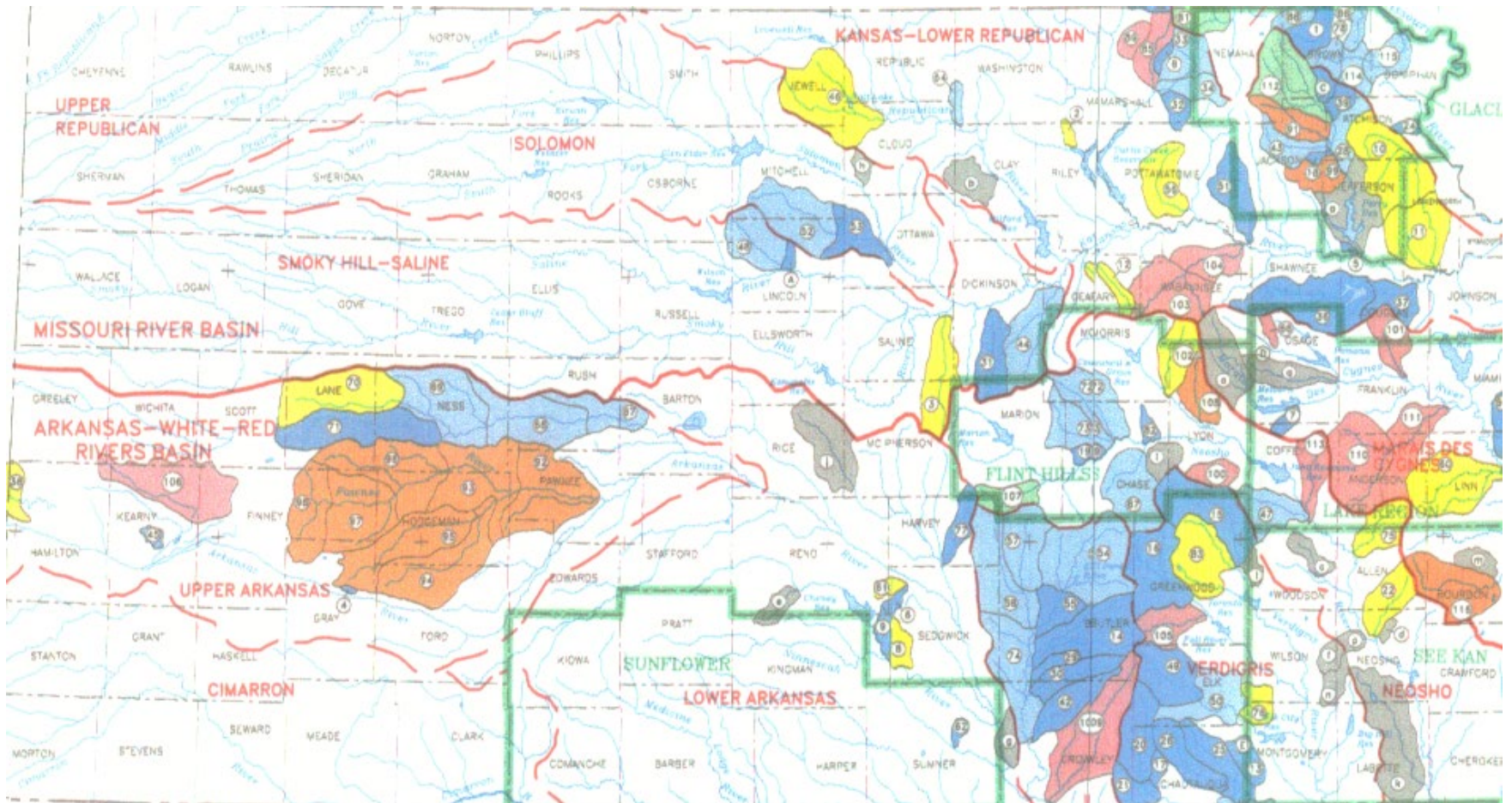

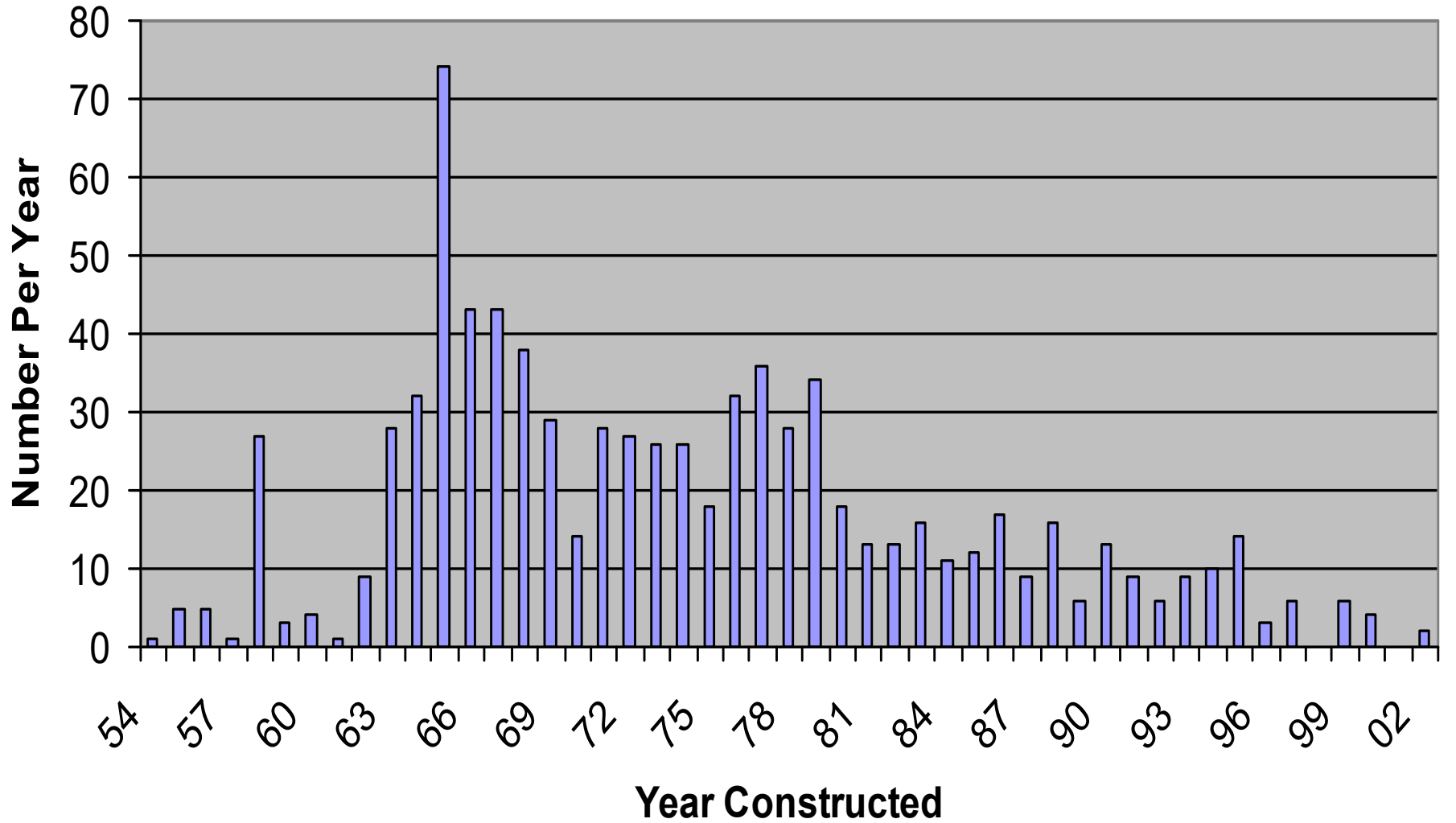
Most Recent Inventories Lists 825

State and Locally Funded Dams



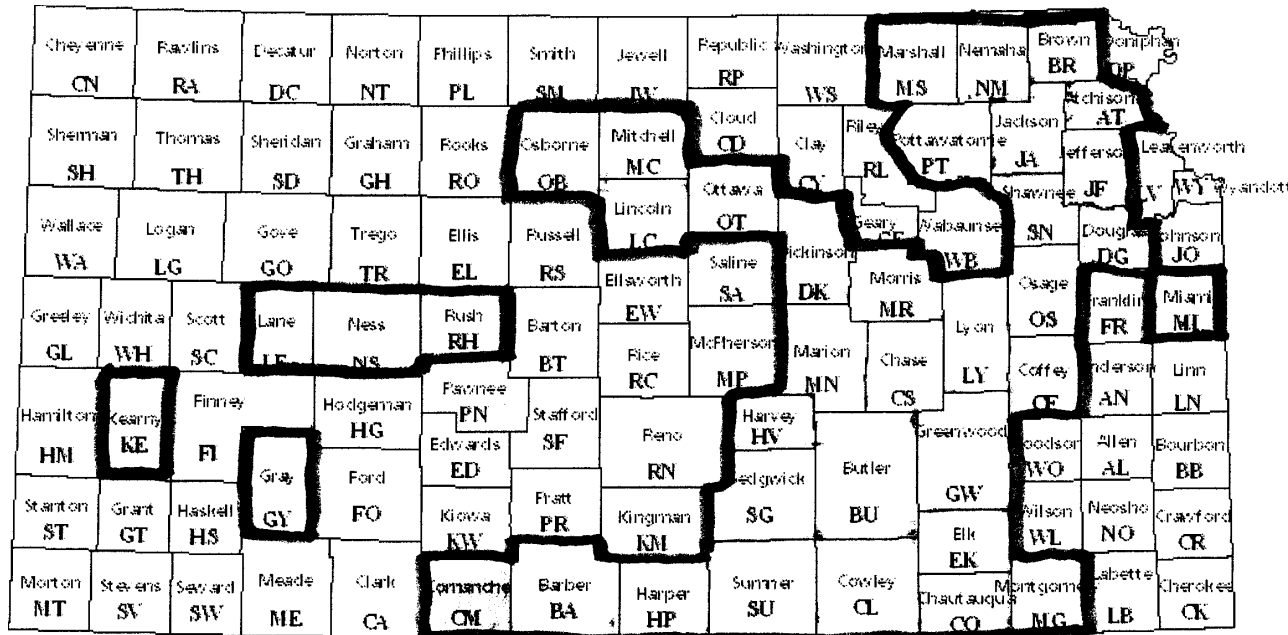
# Kansas Watersheds - 85 Districts



# Kansas PI 566 Construction

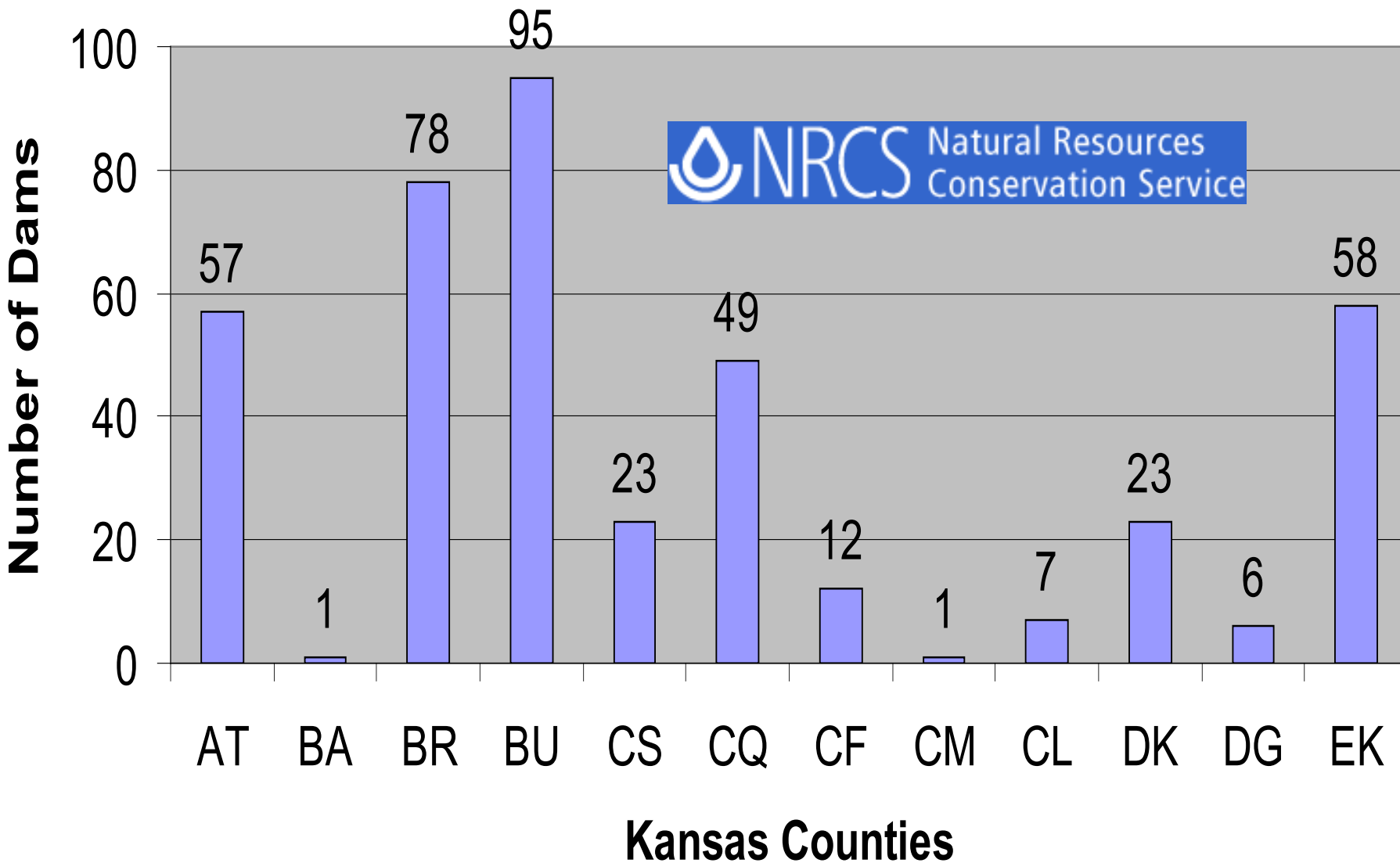


# Federal Dams Constructed in 38 Different Counties



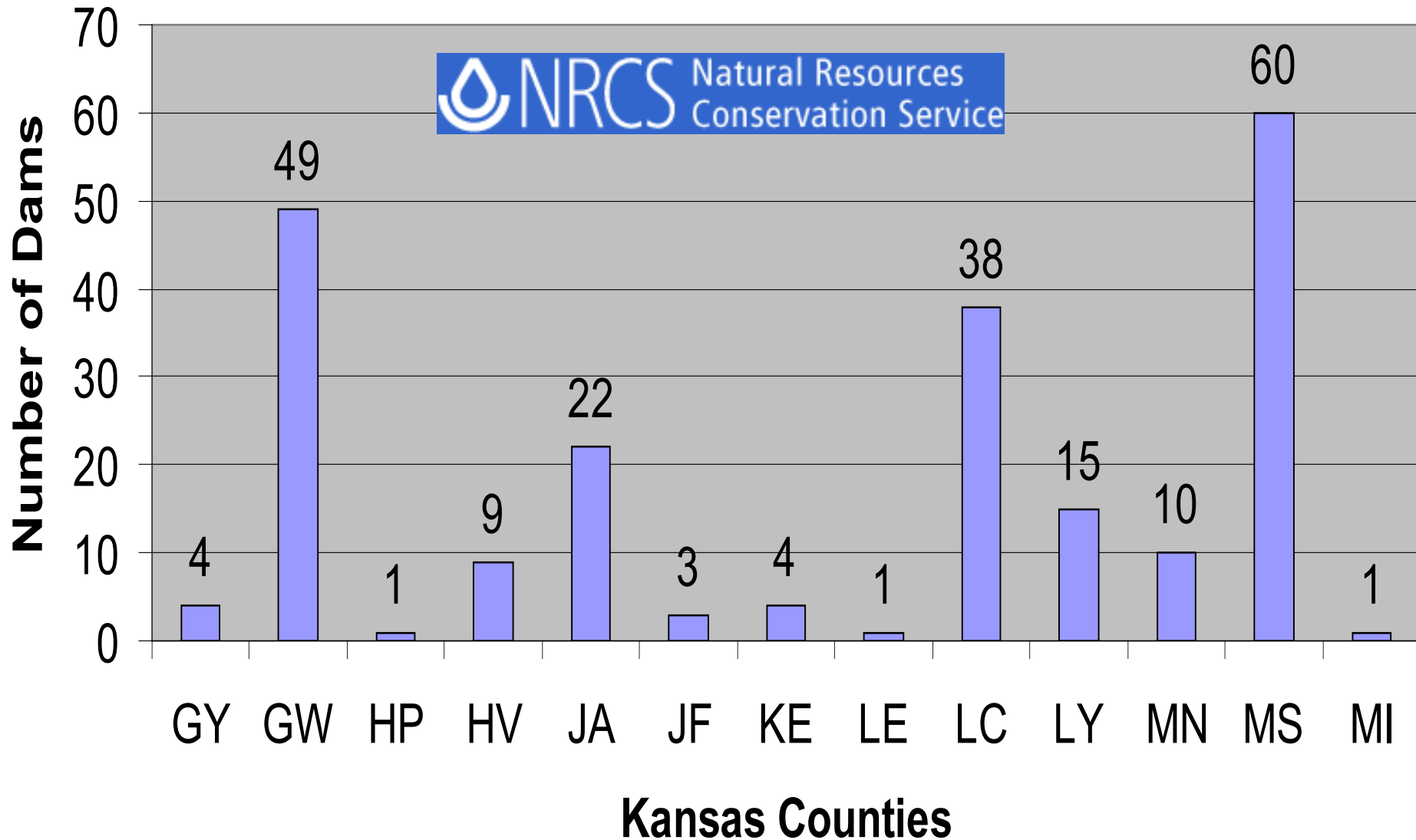


# Federal Dams in Counties AT-EK

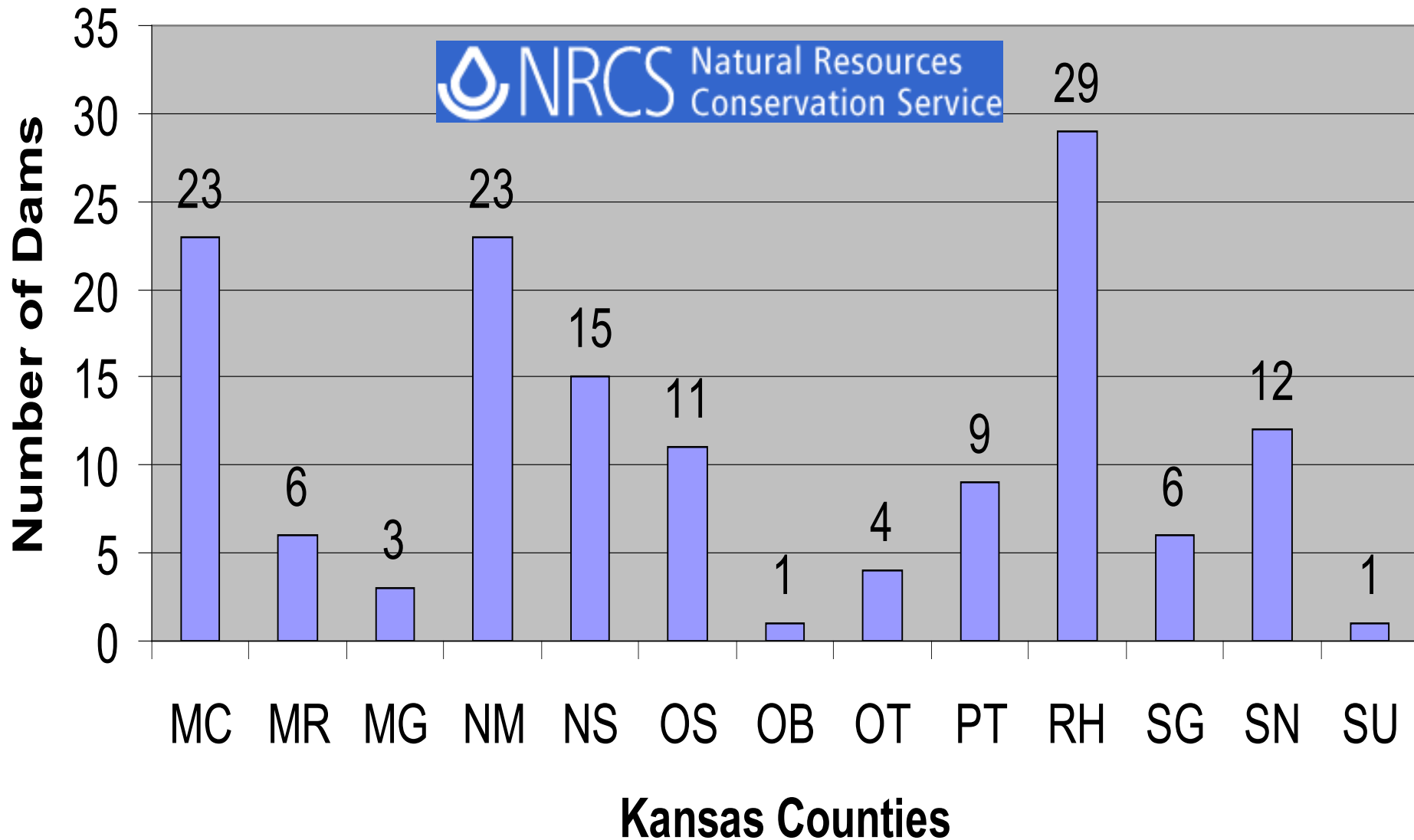




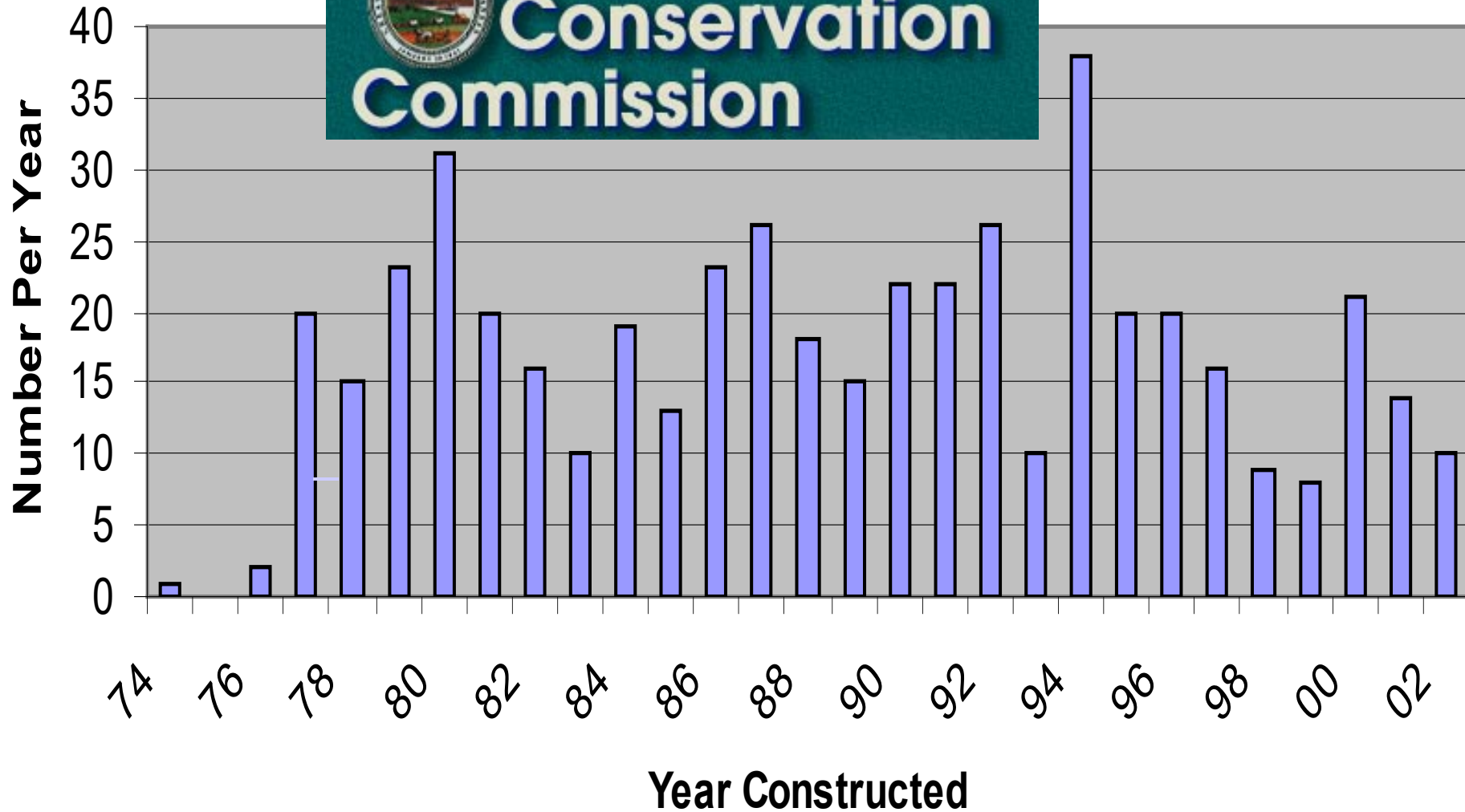
# Federal Dams in Counties GY-MI



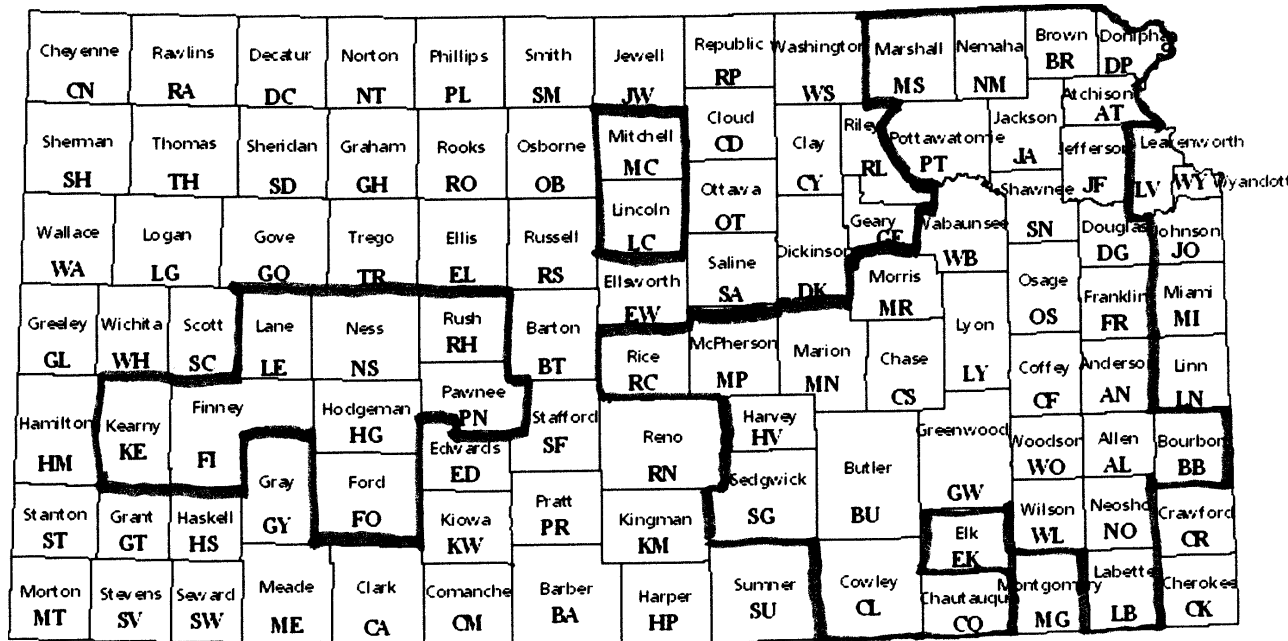
# Federal Kansas Dams in Counties MC-SU



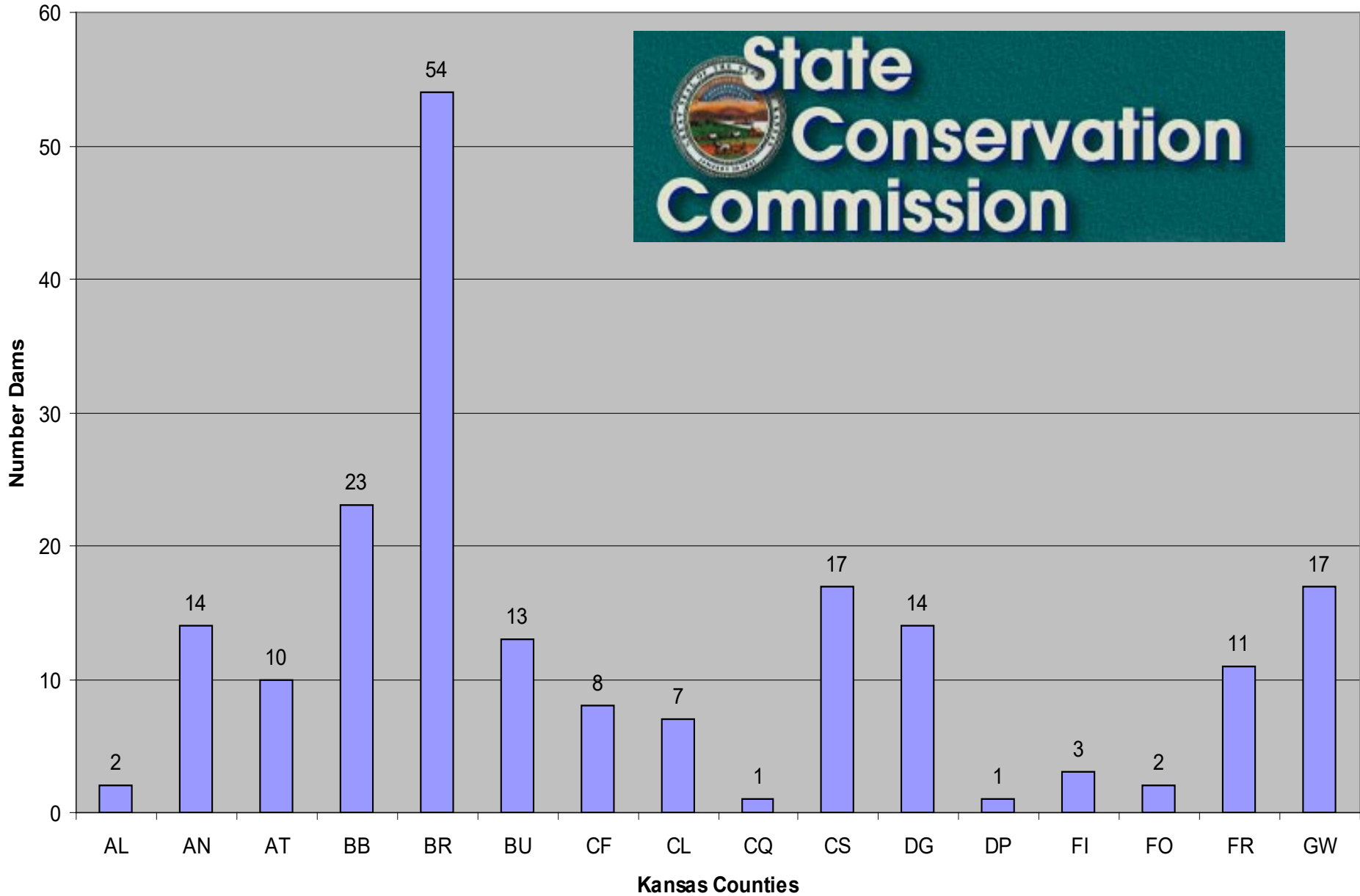
# Kansas KCC Construction



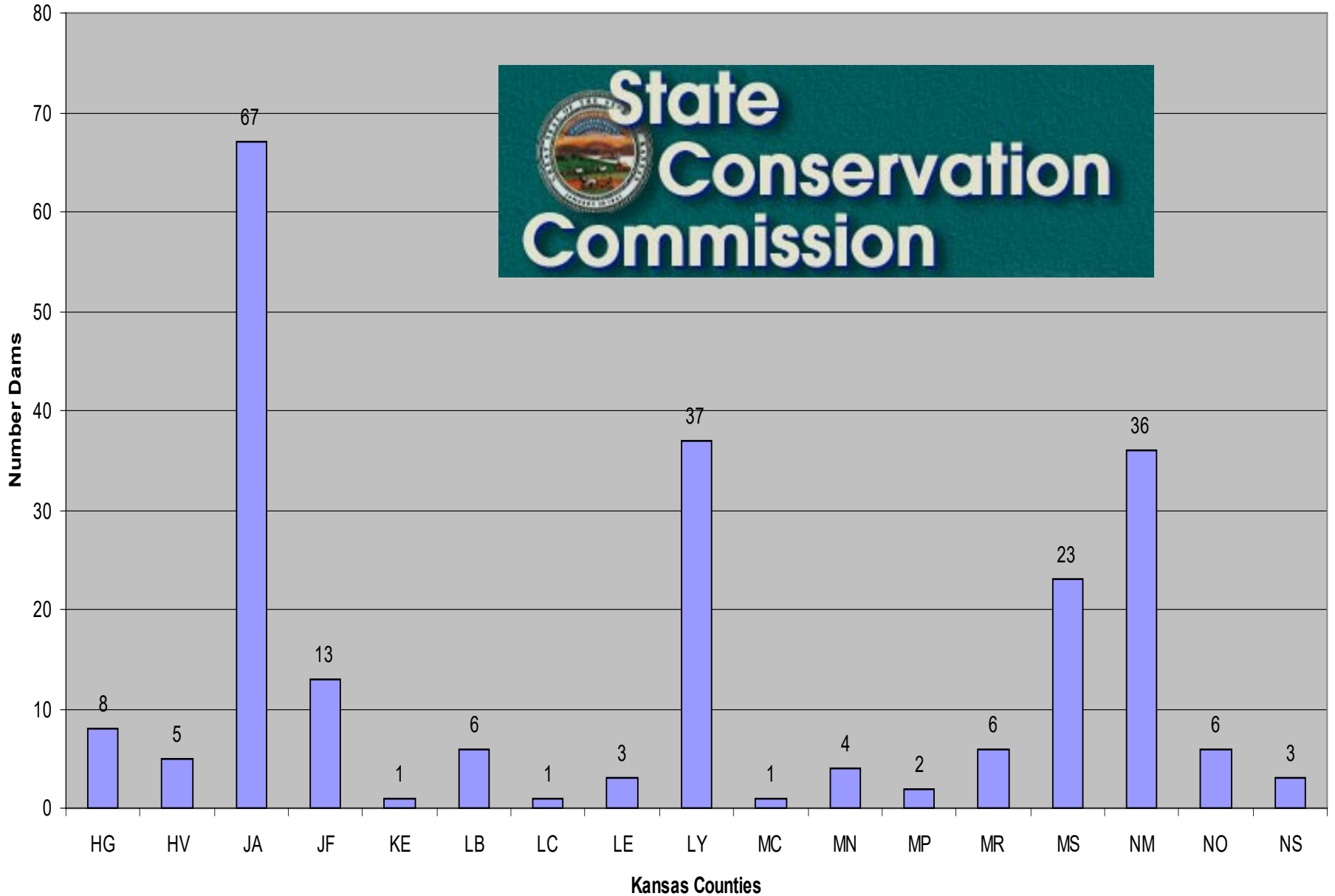
# State Funded Dams Through SCC Program Constructed in 43 Counties



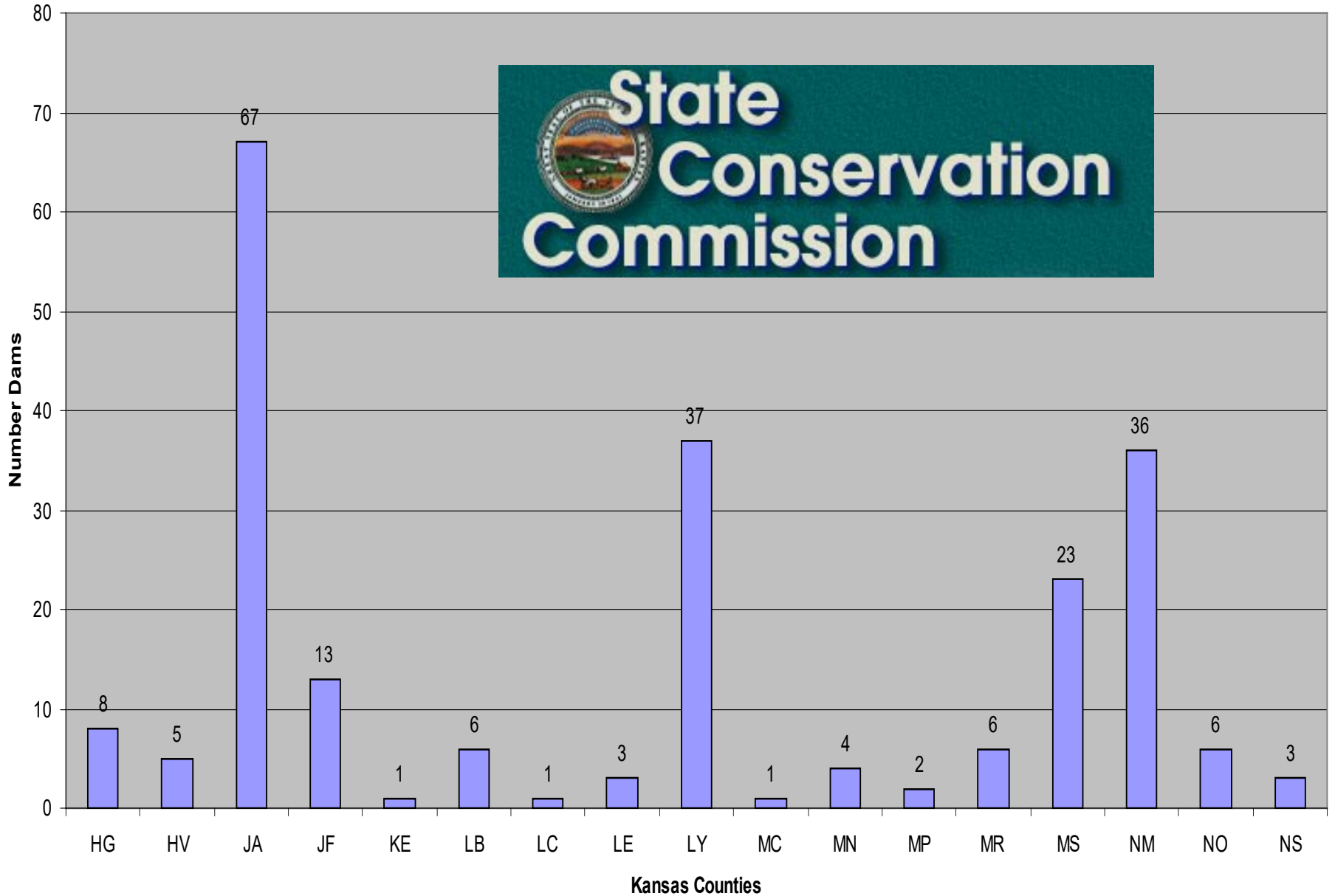

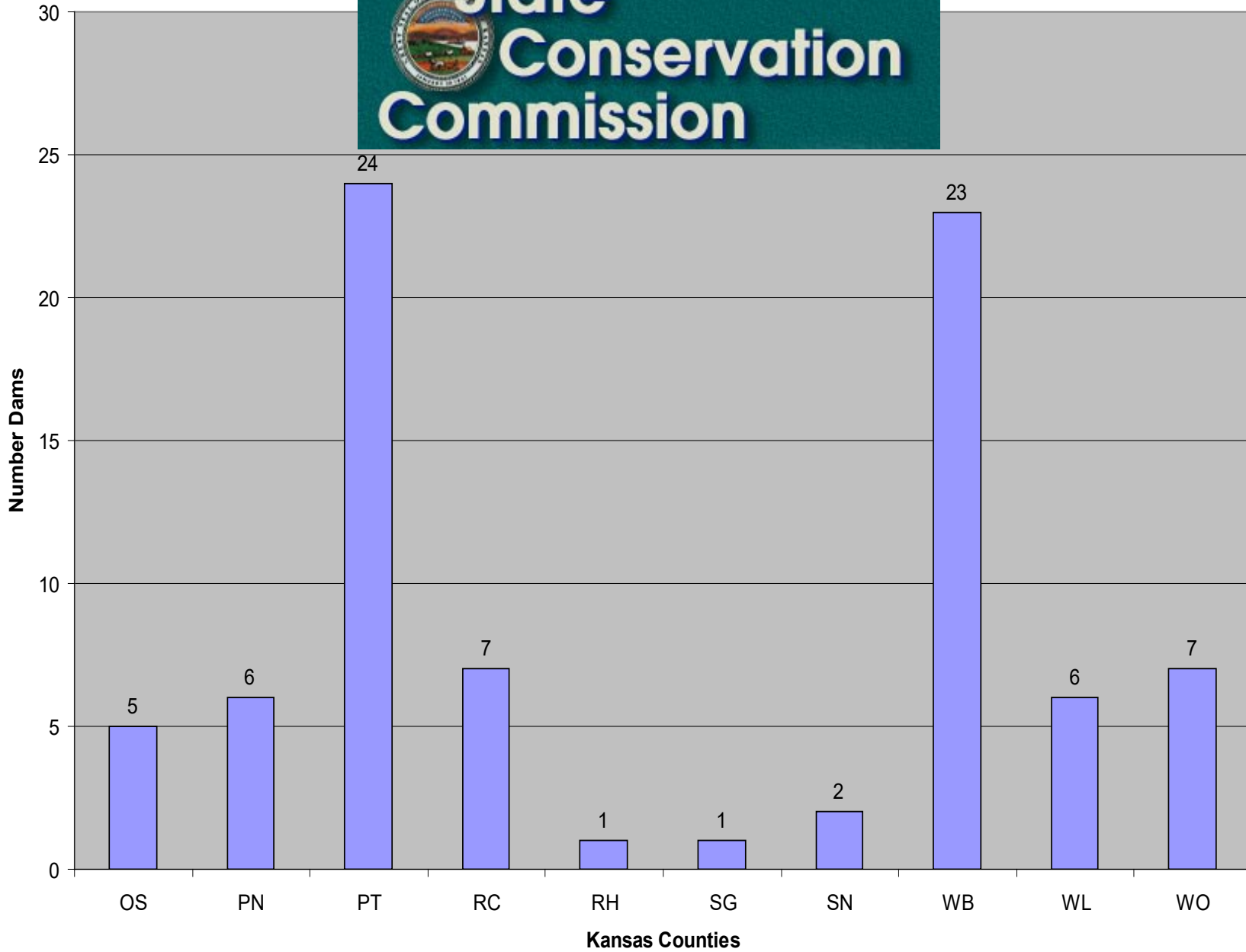

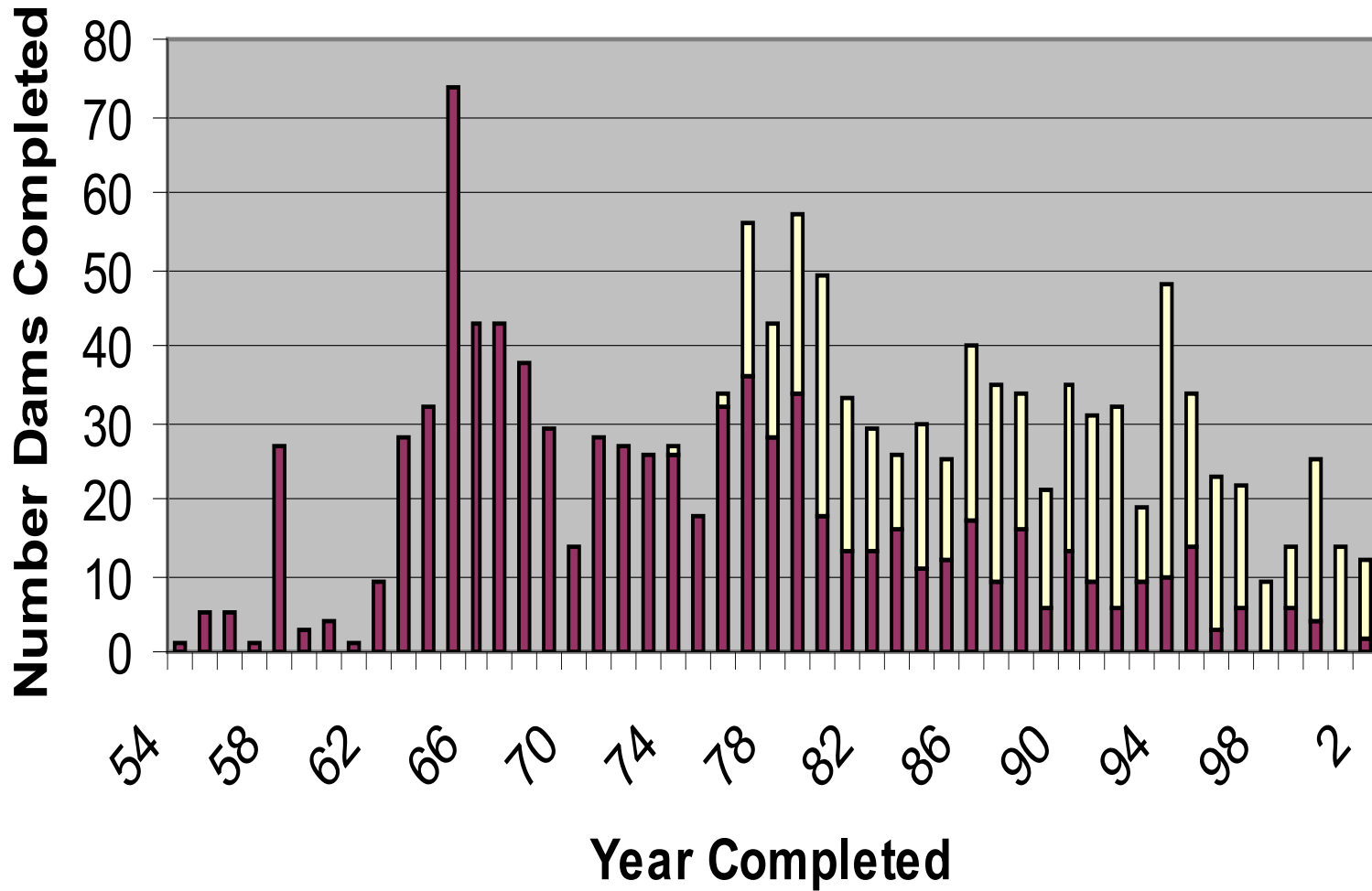
